Prominent battles in the Civil War included: the Battle of Edgehill on 23 October 1642 (which ended in stalemate), the Battle of Marston Moor on 2 July 1644 (which saw the Royalist forces in the north defeated by the Parliamentarians) and the Battle of Naseby on 14 June

At the end of June 1644 the combined armies of the English Parliament and the Scottish Estates laid siege to York When the king's main field army under Prince Rupert arrived to raise the siege, the result was the greatest of the battles of the civil war, Marston Moor (2 July 1644) Cromwell commanded the left wing of the 28,000-strong
